About This Survey

This survey is not a public opinion survey on marriage and family. It does not seek the general opinion of local Catholics on marriage. The survey was conducted with the intention of obtaining qualitative results, not quantitative. Its value does not come from numerical statistics, but from the voices of faithful Catholics of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia seeking to live their vocations and looking to the Church to support them.

Seeking the Sensus Fidelium

Whenever the Church seeks discernment about her path forward, she looks to the treasuries of the Holy Spirit that are at her disposal. One of these treasuries is the *sense of faith* (*sensus fidei*) of baptized believers. The Church believes that "the faithful have an instinct for the truth of the Gospel, which enables them to recognize and endorse authentic Christian doctrine and practice and to reject what is false. That supernatural instinct…is called the *sensus fidei*…" In other words, it is possible to find among faithful Catholics, in their insights and reflections, a rich source of truth about the movement of the Holy Spirit among His people.

The *sensus fidei* must be distinguished from public opinion.² Any attempt to consult the authentic sense of faith of the People of God must recognize that this gift is intimately tied to baptism and therefore dependent upon a person's adherence by manner of life to his or her baptismal vows. A person does not participate in the *sensus fidei* simply because of formal membership in the Church. Instead, certain dispositions are necessary for the faithful to participate in this supernatural instinct of faith. These are:

- Full participation in the life of the Church
- Listening to the Word of God
- Openness to reason and its relation to faith
- Adherence to the Magisterium
- Holiness
- Seeking the edification of the Church³

The body of truths that emerges collectively from those who possess the *sensus fidei* is called the *sense of the faithful (sensus fidelium)* and it is this that was sought in the conducting of this survey. In gathering thoughtful responses from faithful Catholics of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, our hope is to glean from their reflections and testimonies a glimpse into the supernatural instinct of faith. These valuable contributions will serve as an important source of discernment for our local Church as we seek to reform our pastoral care of married couples and the family.

Given the qualitative nature of this survey, it requires time and prayerful reading to process its results. The next page contains a summary of the six themes that emerged most regularly from the respondents. Following the summary is a compilation of many of the verbatim responses of the faithful. Please consider reading them prayerfully and attentively.

SUMMARY OF RESPONSES FROM MARRIAGE AND FAMILY SURVEY CONDUCTED SUMMER 2017



The following were the six most repeated themes that emerged from the 200 survey responses from our families. Examples of each of these themes can be found in the following pages, which contain actual, verbatim responses from the married couples and families of the Archdiocese.

- 1. **Bold, clear, unequivocal teaching, especially in homilies:** Almost every survey response included a plea to the leaders of the Church to teach them the fullness of the Church's teachings on marriage and family, especially in the Sunday homily. Many indicated their disappointment with the silence of their parish leaders on these subjects, which they perceive as stemming from cowardice or lack of confidence in the truth of the teachings. Almost across the board, families expressed that they and their children are incessantly being bombarded by false messages from the culture and crave to hear from their shepherds instruction in the teachings of the Church about marriage and family with boldness and confidence.
 - a. Related to this often-repeated point was the testimony of a number of couples who had received advice from Church leaders in the confessional and in conversation that was contrary to the teachings of the Church. This advice has resulted, in a number of cases, to suffering in the marriage for those who followed the poor counsel.
- 2. Opportunities to form community: The second most repeated petition from the surveys was the desire for more opportunities for married couples to build relationships with other married couples in order to find support in their vocation and life of faith. The lack of community among married couples who want to live their faith was lamented by many. Suggestions to address this included: parish-based socializing opportunities for married couples, mentoring programs in which older, more experienced couples offer guidance to younger couples, and more opportunities for couples to share their testimonies with each other by way of encouragement in the faith.
- 3. **Childcare is a** *must* **for parish activities:** A high majority of the surveys indicated that for couples to participate in parish-based ministries, childcare must be provided. Couples pointed to the high cost of babysitting and the precious hours they would spend away from

their children as the reason why it is so difficult for them to participate in parish events. Many couples requested that parishes offer them "date nights" and indicated that childcare must be provided in order for this to serve them well.

- 4. The Sacraments are the greatest gift to a marriage: Across the board, almost every survey indicated that the highest contribution of the Church to their marriage and/or family life was the gift of the Eucharist and Confession. A number of surveys remarked that increased opportunities for Confession, rather than just the Saturday evening option, would be a very welcome gift in support of their married and family life.
- 5. **Availability of priests:** A strong portion of the surveys expressed deep gratitude for priests who have been available to them, ready and willing to offer accompaniment in their marriage and family life. Many have experienced priests who have been a great help in their vocation. An equally strong portion of the surveys expressed disappointment in the lack of availability of their priests, their distance from their people, their indifference, or even a negative or dismissive attitude. The consistent theme among them all was that the closeness and availability of their priests, or lack thereof, has a very strong impact on married couples and families, for better or for worse.
- 6. **Destigmatization of marital problems and marriage counseling:** Many respondents shared that while they had marital problems to greater or lesser degree, it is very difficult for them to disclose their marital problems or ask for help because of the perceived stigma surrounding marital difficulties. Many expressed that parishes could do a great service to their marriage by helping to de-stigmatize marital difficulties and pave the way for more open discussion and paths of healing for couples who are struggling. Many pointed to the very high cost of marriage counseling and asked the Church to find a way to help them access faithful Catholic therapists who could assist them with their difficulties.

- Fruitfulness openness to the children God wishes to bring through your union

This section is about marriage. Questions about family life and raising children will be asked on the next page.

QUESTION 1

In what ways has the Church supported you in living your vocation to marriage? How has your parish, school or local Catholic institution helped you grow and mature in love for each other, in understanding the meaning of your marriage, and in living your marriage vows faithfully? If possible, please give examples.

QUESTION 2

In what ways have you experienced the Church as absent, unsupportive, neutral or even a negative influence in your life as a married couple? Have there been times when you have needed help in living your marriage vows and not received the help you needed? Please give examples if possible.

QUESTION 3

In what ways does the local Church of Philadelphia need to be reformed to better serve married couples in living faithfully to their vows? Please be specific, even offering suggestions of what a parish, school or Catholic organization might do.

Part II – The Mission of Your Family

Introduction: Your family exists to be the place where God's love is revealed, encountered, and shared. The way you love each other in your family becomes a "school of love" that instructs all the members of your family in the way of God's love. Responses were received from 200 families from all 5 counties of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Survey responses were received in English and in Spanish. The following text contains actual verbatim responses from the surveys received.

Question 1

In what ways has the Church supported you in living your vocation to marriage? How has your parish, school or local Catholic institution helped you grow and mature in love for each other, in understanding the meaning of your marriage, and in living your marriage vows faithfully? If possible, please give examples.

I was married for 30 years to a non Catholic man who did not practice any form of religion. Our three children were raised Catholic and attended Catholic school through 12th grade. My parish community was a strong base for us with support through good and bad times. Because I am an active member of my parish both other parishioners and priests were most helpful during the difficult times of the divorce and beyond. I strongly believe in the Catholic view of marriage and the beauty of married life. Unfortunately, it was not something that was part of my exhusband's beliefs.

The truth is that the John XXIII Movement is where we have received an unconditional support about marriage in general and my own marriage. For example, when we receive the new retreatants in the closing Masses, the great majority leave with the desire to complete their sacraments and the great majority only lack the sacrament of matrimony.

When I listen to Father Ianelli's, Monsignor Gentili's, Deacon Brady's homilies during Sunday mass, I feel an overpowering sense of responsibility to honor my husband by being a kind, patient, caring, and faithful wife. Maintaining a strong marriage, especially with the addition of a newborn, is difficult. Father Ianelli and Monsignor Gentili give me hope during hard times.

Going to mass together and sharing that beautiful experience has made our love grow. My husband and I both work in a social outreach ministry at our church and that experience has drawn us closer together. The teachings of the church emphasize the meaning of marriage and living our marriage vows. We sit at Mass and hold hands and just feel so very, very close to each other and to God.

When I was married, each week at mass, one of the General Intercessions always asked that we pray to keep our marriages strong and live in the way that reflected our teachings of Christ. I took great comfort in knowing that we were all praying for each other. Also, every Sunday mass near Valentine's Day they had all the married couples stand and renew their vows.

Fr often gives homilies that touch on his family life. He uses these stories to inspire us as he relates them to teachings of the gospel and I come home every Sunday from mass, feeling that I've learned valuable lessons to remember or apply in my everyday family life. However, just last year at this time, I was speaking with a friend who is involved in a "Cana date night" program through their church and I thought is sounded like a phenomenal program. I had another friend who had pass along their "Beloved" cds, another program to support and deepen the bond of marriage through the church. I was disappointed in the lack of programs available through our church, so I approached the director of pastoral ministries and spoke about these programs and my interest, desire and offered to help support these types of programs at SSPP with volunteer time. I was told that the programs did not fit with the vision of the Church for advancement at that time and was directed to a bible study group, which isn't quite support for married couples in the same manner.
Chester County, Married 0-10 years
Our parish, St. Ann's in Phoenixville, has supported us in our marriage through the monthly Cana Date Nights for couples. This is an evening where couples share dinner, fellowship, and have a presentation/discussion about faith and marriage. There is also child care provided, which is crucial.
Chester County, Married 0-10 years
I believe that through various Church programs, such as a Dynamic Catholic speaker coming to our parish to speak about marriage, have helped and strengthened our marriage. We do a renewal of vows at Valentines Day during Mass, which is very nice. Our pastor is very traditional Catholic, which has also helped our marriage with staying true to the Catholic faith in his message, especially about the sacrament of marriage.

The Church's teaching and writing has been helpful. However, I do not feel that any of the parishes that I have lived in have done anything practical to help besides the obvious assistance of the sacraments. There is far more practical help for couples looking for an annulment.

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The Church has some wonderful documents to support couples in living out a healthy marriage vocation. Some include, Humanae Vitae and the Theology of the Body teachings. While hearing about these examples from the pulpit, we have sought to educate ourselves on these teachings as there are little to no concrete opportunities for couples to explore these in the parishes in which we have lived. We have offered to create marriage support group activity in our parish, but our time is limited due to caring for children and parishioners do not show to advertised events. Having grown up in NE Philly, we did not know many people living their Catholic faith fully. When we moved to Delaware County, we were blessed to meet many faithful families through channels such as the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (Barbara Bonella at St. Philomena's in Lansdowne, then St. Andrew in Drexel Hill), Noah's Ark (Moms rosary group at St. Madeline's in Ridley Park), Regina Angelorum Academy in Ardmore, and Man Up Philly. It was by connecting with these married couples and their families that we have been able to support each other in our walk as Catholics.

The Church helped me before marriage with Pre-Cana classes. Also, the Pastoral Familiar has helped, but I believe it's possible to do more at the parish level.

Our parish has supported us by making us aware of opportunities like Marriage Encounter and Retrovaille. Our pastor, when speaking of the occasion of sin and sin's consequences, frequently uses the example of being unfaithful to one's spouse even in little ways.

- (2) Retrouvalle is offered in the bulletin occasionally, but never promoted from the pulpit or mentioned by priests. If it was encouraged, I think more people would attend.
- (3) in 2015, prior to World Meeting of Families, Meghan Cokeley visited our parish and did a talk on: "An Introduction to the Catholic Church's Teachings on the Human Person, the Body and Sexuality." This was the VERY first time we heard the Church present these teachings. She did an outstanding job defending the Truth, presenting these teachings with courage, boldness, and deep meaning & insight. Unfortunately, we've never heard priests teach this message in this manner
- (4) Also in 2015, our parish did a 6-week book study on "Love Is Our Mission: The Family Fully Alive" which was the catechism provided to us by the Church through the Office for the New Evangelization on difficult topics such as:
 - -sexual relations outside of marriage,
 - -chastity & celibacy,
 - -contraception,
 - -porn
 - -same sex "marriage"

This book and study guide explained how God created us for joy and how we are called to love as God loves. It explained how all of Catholic teaching about family life flows from our beliefs about Jesus and it is by loving God and one another that we are fully alive. What was most appreciated again is that the book presented the "why's" (and not just the what's) of the Church's s teachings which people found so very enlightening & refreshing.

It would be a wise idea to offer this book study on a more regular basis and have it promoted by priests and pastors so that more people would attend.

Our pastor is personally very supportive of our family and families in general. He makes it a point to be directly involved in our family's walk and has a personal relationship with each of us He also emphasizes communal events to encourage families to get to know each other to strengthen the Body of Christ.
Montgomery County, Married 11-25 year
We have received little institutional support from our parishes since we were married five years ago. The extent of the support has come from friendships (that we have sought out) with younger priests and the occasional homily about the Church's teaching on marriage. In truth, the majority of the support we receive comes from networking with other serious Catholic couples. The parishes that we have been part of have not offered much.

We've been in the same parish for 44 years. I don't ever remember an event that focused on improving our marriage. We sought that elsewhere through retreats, strong Catholic friends and Marriage Encounter. I'm sure that there are priests and parishes sensitive to this but they

are rare in my experience. usually, this is a lay person apostolate. The church needs to encourage it and promote it and seek the right people to lead it.
Bucks County, Married 26+ years
We feel very supported in living our marriage as a vocation within the Church. We are surrounded by other couples who also believe in marriage as a Sacrament which strengthens our faith. We have been given the opportunity at our parish to help guide couples who are preparing for marriage with our involvement in PreCana. There are often speakers and opportunities for us to continue to grow our marriage in our immediate area.

At our church the primary opportunities have been chances for us to attend and participate in various ministries together as a couple and also for our entire family. Activities like AbbeyFest, Marriage Alpha, and our annual church picnic have been times for us to be together as a married couple or as a family experiencing worship, joy, and community as a family. We also have felt very loved by our Deacon at various points of financial and health crisis in our life.

By being a consistent public voice in support for marriage, family and the sanctity of life amid the changing and challenging cultural views. This has strengthened us in our beliefs. Also, various educational opportunities the Church/parish have offered (Theology of the Body and others) have provided us with moral guidance and teaching to help us make decisions about how we approached infertility, cared for our aging parents and decisions about how we spend our time/resources as a couple that have helped us deepen and better understand our relationship.

Our Pastor has been extremely supportive. We were uneducated about the faith. My husband was an atheist and we were married in City Hall. Monsignor guided us through counseling and we had our marriage blessed. He was very clear and patient in instructing us about the Church's teachings on the vocation of marriage as a convenient. He explained the Church's teaching on openness to life thoroughly. His love and kindness was instrumental in my husband's conversion. He taught an excellent RCIA and my husband was baptized and became a devout Catholic. We struggle financially and after giving birth to our second child, Monsignor thought to offer us money that another parishioner donated for a family in need. Our Parish is very welcoming and there are many faithful, dedicated married couples devoted to serving the church. We always feel supported by the Church in our vocation as a married couple. The greatest help to our marriage (preparation, formation, realistic expectations, deep understanding of the nature of marriage, etc.) has come from our parents. Secondly, the most helpful support has been in the form of three Archdiocesan priests: Fr. Chris Walsh, Fr. Matt Guckin, and Fr. Kevin McCabe. Each spent time (lots of time!) working with us (individually and as a couple), praying with and for Dan and me, answering our questions, and helping us navigate difficult moments leading up to our marriage and since we've been married.

The sacramental life of the Church has been beneficial to my marriage. Unfortunately, the local and national church did not clarify the church's position on sterility 25 years ago which meant that I did a reverse vasectomy 10 years later when I better understood the church's teaching. This was before St JP2nd's encyclical on Humanae Vitae.

In general the Church is the only institution that encourages Forgiveness with the Sacrament of Reconciliation without which our marriage would not have survived coming on 52 years. The Church welcomed all of our children with joy. All of our pastors give us encouragement Chester County, Married 26+ years
Our Pastor, and our Vicar speak frequently of the sanctity of married life. They encourage couples who are not married in the Church to pray for the grace to be married in the Church. For couples married in the Church, they also encourage frequent reception of the Sacraments, especially Reconciliation and The Holy Eucharist, both as food for a happy married life. Each year we have asked our Pastors to give us their blessing when we celebrate our Anniversary. They have always complied with great joy.

The main way the Church supports our marriage is by providing plenty of opportunity for mass, confession, and eucharistic adoration. Homilies are generally doctrinally sound. False teachings about marriage and sexuality are not endorsed or insinuated

Chester County, Married 26+ years

In what ways has the Church supported our living our vocation to marriage? Years ago the Archdiocese sponsored NFP classes. My husband and I attended. We were so inspired about what we learned - I am a health care professional and in 1988 I was only offered birth control pills from my ob/gyn for family planning. My parents never discussed anything with me but my mother did admit to me the night before our wedding that she and my father used condoms. Our pre cana did not address this. One woman did ask the question about what should we do about family planning and the priest running the pre cana actually said to follow your conscience. There was no discussion of the fact that it had to be well informed.

How has your parish, school or local Catholic institution helped you grow and mature in love for each other, in understanding the meaning of your marriage, and in living your marriage vows faithfully?

Initially, it did very little. When I called the Archdiocese to get marital counseling after the birth of our first child (I discovered that my husband was viewing pornography, and I was devastated). We attended sessions at the Catholic Social Service center that was in ----. I remember the intake coordinator on the phone telling me "you think you are the first woman to ever discover their husband doing this?" - actually dismissive of my hurt and fears. They gave us a woman counselor who was not Catholic and she told us that viewing pornography was not a sin - only if he acted out on his fantasies. I told her that Jesus said even lusting after a woman was wrong - but I was more upset about the fact that she didn't seem to know the Catholic faith and was working under the Archdiocese social service. At the end of the sessions she recommended that my husband get additional counseling to resolve issues in his family of origin and that was it.

When we moved to a very faith filled community that had a pro life ministry, we were introduced to the Theology of the Body - Christopher West gave a talk at the parish. Later, we volunteered to be a witness couple for the parish Joy Filled marriage program based on the Theology of the Body

Montgomery County, Married 26+ years

The wider archdiocesan community is big enough that if you look, you can find the support you need for help with marriage. For example, thank God for Barbara Rose and her dedicated NFP apostolate, which has helped my wife and me many times. I am also grateful for the shrines around town that make confession available at many times during the week other than Saturday, so that confession/spiritual counsel is available. I am grateful for other things: the Archbishop's lecture series, the "Love Is Our Mission" book, the Theology of the Body apostolate, Generation Life, the Culture Project, etc. I would just note that all of this is outside normal parish culture. Normal parish people aren't getting any of this. To get this stuff, you have to be unusually motivated and know to dig for it. The parish, where most people are most of the time, is mostly silent and absent on these issues. See next question.

Philadelphia, Married 11-25 years

One-on-one, many of the priests/lay ministers/volunteers of the Archdiocese are doing heroic work to be present to, and encourage, married couples. I know priests who are chaplains to Teams of Our Lady, host dinners in their own rectories, and etc. Many individuals are doing heroic, solitary work to try and support couples. But they need so much help!!! They are often operating solo!

Good books are always available in the narthex of our parish (Annunciation BVM, Havertown), the priests regularly bring married life into their homilies, the priests are good confessors and offer good spiritual advice. Our daughter's school (an independent Catholic school--Regina Angelorum Academy) has a Valentine's dinner with a talk each year--kind of a date night. I get the majority of my formation through Opus Dei since I'm a cooperator. They offer monthly circles on virtues with lots of practical advice about married life and parenting, and sometimes they host couples evenings (e.g., this spring they hosted a dinner with Damon Owens as a speaker--really great).

Starting with the Bishop I really appreciate his homilies each week on podcast. Then the emails from the Office of the New Evangelization are filled with useful opportunities to grow in our individual and married faith. I have found both very helpful and are easy to access for anyone who is pro-active in seeking support and information.

I was also recently able to find a Spiritual Director, Fr Eduardo de la Torre, LC. So I am thankful the diocese supports having the Legionares in the community.

At our parish, St Denis in Havertown, they held a virtual marriage retreat during Lent that was a huge success. I would recommend more parishes offering the same opportunity. The material was found through the USCCB.

We were blessed to be prepared for marriage first by our own parents and the example they gave us and then through the generosity of a priest in my parish who met with us several times to guide our journey.

A little over 5 years into our marriage we were faced with a medical crisis that left me unable to bear more children. It was a tough time for both of us. I was undergoing a torrent of emotional stuff as well as physical issues requiring rehab and other support. My husband was working and doing all he could to be the best parent he could be to our girls, and manage the household. A priest, who has since become a dear friend, sat with us a few times and helped us sort through all the pain as he reminded us of our vows and our relationship with the Lord. He also put us in touch with others in our parish community who could help us with some of the basic needs so we could once again focus on us and our family.

With the help of God and many others, we got back on track and have remained strong these many years. God willing we'll celebrate 40years of marriage in December.

Delaware County, Married 26+ years
Honestly, much as I Love our church and pastor, they really do not offer classes, discussion or groups focused on marriage. There is no literature available. I just recently discovered the Archdiocesan groups through my own research and it has been a great resource for me and my husband. As well, the ability to access such documents as Theology of the Body and reading Archbishop Chaput's book: Strangers in a Strange Land, have been helpful in understanding our vocation more fully.
Montgomery County, Married 26+ years
I am sorry, our local parish has not been directly helpful in supporting our marriage and family life. There are school activities and fund raisers that could be considered "date nights" but, other than that Rarely, if ever do we hear anything about marriage from the pulpit nor, how the sacraments may help us in our vocation. There is little opportunity to come and share together with other families in a way that specifically supports marriage and family. I am grateful, however, that we have found friends through our parish community.
Chester County, Married 11-25 years
Unfortunately, I cannot think of any way in which our local church has helped us in our vocation to marriage. We do belong to a Catholic couples group - Teams of our Lady ("TOOL"). We believe that this group - which does include a religious member (currently a priest for our team) - has helped us tremendously with our vocation. We periodically reach out to help publicize TOOL within various parishes to start new teams. I highly suggest that the Diocese learn more about TOOL - I am certain that current members of the various Teams throughout our Diocese would be

willing to come and share our experiences with those in the Diocese interested in listening.

St. Ann's Cana Ministry (in Phoenixville), which includes childcare, has encouraged us to prioritize our marriage with a monthly date night. It also helps us to focus on our Faith in ways we might not otherwise often find time to discuss.

The homilies often focus on the importance of marriage and family...this helps reset what the world influences.

Our personal engagement in the church and helping the community to be a bigger part of what the family does. It allows us to set example for our children and hopefully bring them forward to act the same way.

We completed a marriage preparation course in accordance with the archdiocesan requirements. There was a lack of instruction on sexual issues, such as chastity, pornography, contraception and natural family planning. The facilitators were not able to answer our questions about these topics. One could extrapolate that these couples were not living according the Catholic faith when it comes to these issues. We are aware that there are other still marriage preparation program facilitators who are also not willing or capable to discuss such matters to this day. This sends a very negative and confusing message about these and other beautiful teachings of the Church to an audience who, many of which, is already addicted to pornography, cohabitating and contracepting. Our opinion is that unchastity and subsequent contraception use are the root of marital problems. Further, it is very difficult to squeeze a quality discussion on these and other important topics into a two-day (~9 hour) marriage preparation course.

Additionally, one priest told us that, regarding fidelity, pornography addiction was not infidelity nor was it sinful.

I have the impression that we often worry about people as they get married, and then again when they divorce and remarry, but in between....we are less attentive. Marriages are by nature private in many respects and it can be hard to know what is going on with a given couple. Nevertheless, even a very good marriage is a challenging one, and couples need to be sustained through friendship, prayer, the sacraments, etc. For myself, I am living in an abusive situation. It is very delicate to be married to a practicing Catholic who is also abusive and know how to address situations discreetly but effectively. I don't know.

While I am doing everything I can for my marriage and do not intend to divorce, I do not know if While the archdiocese has useful links to supports of various kind, my parish has nothing (despite *many* ministries) that would be useful to me, and neither my husband has never had a confessor who seemed to pick up on any issues enough to say anything/ suggest. I have had more direct conversation, and do NOT expect confessors to provide psychological advice but it would be great if they had some direction to point people in when they sense the marriage issues are more serious than normal.

(I will note, since I'm not sure if there will be a space later, that I know several marriages with issues similar to mine, some where the abusive spouse has an (sometimes) advanced degree in theology from a very solid institution; there are certainly places and cases where people have been badly formed theologically. But I think we often underestimate how broken many people are--especially in recent generations. And how fragile they are, and unwilling to admit their broken-ness so they can be healed).

As Evangelization Coordinator of my parish, I will respond to this question not only from my personal perspective as a married person, but also from feedback from parishioners:

- -The Church & pastors have been absent in helping married couples live their marriage vows from the time we were married until the World Meeting of Families in 2015. And after 2015, absence occurred again until this present time whereby the Archbishop has initiated "Remain in my love."
- -We HAVE heard Sunday sermons once in a while about how married couples should love as Christ loves His Church, but our pastors have not initiated any sort of programs or support groups to help married couples live their marriage vows or share Church teachings on married life. Many parishes have eager lay volunteers to help with this, but things have not come to fruition.
- -While I am aware of wonderful programs like Retrouvaille & Worldwide Marriage Encounter, pastors are not promoting these programs from the pulpit or in any way, other than putting a small blurb in the bulletin every once in a while. If pastors & priests only realized what a difference it makes when people hear THEM promote a program, they would do so. They have such a strong influence in people's lives, yet they seldom, if ever promote important programs being offered in their parishes that help families & individuals grow in discipleship.

Delaware County, Married 11-25 years

We are very active Catholics and our faith with God's grace and frequent sacraments sustains us.

We did leave one parish to join another. Reason for leaving was that our former pastor and visiting priests from DeSales on three occasions told the congregation that gay marriage would soon be accepted in the church as a way to save souls.

I communicated directly with my former pastor and admitted the conversation on same sex marriage is difficult, but it is an opportunity to share the church's true and beautiful teaching on marriage - rather than lead the flock to believe the church will soon given in to societal pressure. ... That is when we exited stage right and found another parish home.

Bucks County, Married	11-25 years

We have encountered priests and clerical figures who do not forthrightly declare the teaching of the Church as true. The most common issue that we see is that priests are unwilling to preach about the Church's teaching on marriage out of fear of alienating others.

The majority of the priests that we encounter rarely, if ever, speak about marriage during homilies. Although I have not personally experienced it, we have had other couples tell us that priests have advised them, in the confessional, that activities that are contrary to the Church's teaching are "not that bad." This is the exact opposite of what is needed. It is quite deflating when you are trying to live out the Church's teaching to find out that priests do not take it seriously.

Additionally, there is little to no support for young married couples (immediately after marriage), young parents, and young families. After marriage, newlyweds have an incredible opportunity: to begin building a domestic church to welcome children and others. Yet our parishes neglect this time of formation. We have tons of programming for children (school-

for forming the next generation!) we leave people to their own devices.

We have never felt supported in the raising of our large family from the point of view of contraception. We were the obvious odd and rare couple who obviously practiced Church teaching in this regard. That makes you the butt of jokes from fellow Catholics. Living this kind of non-contraceptive lifestyle is difficult. A couple seeks support from like minded family members and friends when you can find it. There are great lay leaders, books and spiritual reading as resources but one does not find them at the local parish. If you can find a priest who openly supports Catholic teaching on contraception, all the better but he will usually do that only privately.

Indeed, there seems to be no real emphasis on the Sacraments in general. Priests and Deacons, generally speaking, are too timid from the pulpit, often delivering a stale homily that doesn't challenge congregants to live holy lives (much less inspire a young man to contemplate the priesthood). Again, there's no time for hurt feelings or resentment. We are truly grateful for our priests. It's just confounding, with all that is going on in our world today, why the leaders in the Church seem more concerned with preserving the status quo rather than challenge whatever Catholics are still attending Mass on Sundays to live more heroic and holy lives at the risk of "losing" parishioners. Philadelphia, Married 0-10 years The help is there if we need it. We have been in the same parish for 45 years. In that time, many pastors have touched our lives. I don't ever remember a time when help was not available if we asked. Philadelphia, Married 26+ years There have been times that I have been refused Confession during "off-hours", Saturday's, after Mass, etc. Some pastors try to push inclusive language which hurts family life by trying to whitewash gender roles. In this Archdiocese I have seen very little done to focus on the family specially besides a few conferences here and there. . Philadelphia, Married 0-10 years I don't feel my parish at the present time is deeply concerned about the marriages in our community. There is a lack of fellowship and support. Chester County, Married 26+ years As first generation immigrants in this country we truly seek closeness, friendship, and intimacy with our priests as that is how we were both raised. We understand that there are fewer vocations to the priesthood and therefore our priests are strapped for time, but we would love less distance between us and our priests. As a young couple with a baby living amidst a culture supportive of the twisting and perverting of the family image, we need support through friendship in our journey. The laity are constantly patronized. This is profoundly alienating, frustrating, and depressing. Priests are too busy and set in their ways to get to know parishioners as persons. There is practically no sense of the kind of vibrant community life that marriages and families need to

flourish. There is little scope for or encouragement of lay initiatives. On the contrary.

There is an implicit communication that the the Church's teachings are not necessarily good and true, as evidenced by the lack of teaching on marriage and particularly sexuality. I am shocked that Theology of the Body teaching is not being shouted from the roof tops. Teenagers (like my children, but I am helping them) need help, need guidance, and just leaving it to the parents is not good enough. Because the parents (and yes, I know they love and care for their kids) are not formed well in the faith.
Philadelphia, Married 11-25 years
The parish and our school are totally AWOL on these issues. We did nothing for the World Meeting of Families about marriage or sexuality. In over a decade of never missing a Sunday Mass, I have yet to hear my pastor or any of our parochial vicars explain anything about the Church's teaching on marriage, family, or sex. My guess is that they either don't believe it or they are deeply afraid. Maybe two or three times I've heard our pastor say we should be cautious about what we look at on the internet, and maybe two or three times I've heard a retired priest in residence mention contraception in a litany of other issues that merit concern. But nobody has explained why the Church teaches what it teaches. And except for the time a friend and me volunteered to teach a "Theology of the Body for Middle Schoolers" after hours at our PREP program (which got no official support from the pulpit), nothing has happened in over a decade at my parish to form young people on these issues. Meanwhile we blithely marry cohabiting couples and lose our post-confirmation teens who are convinced the Church has nothing to say to them. At the parish level, they are more or less correct.

A nun, a counselor I went to for help, recommended I leave the marriage. I have remained married but I don't know how to heal the hurt or fix things.

QUESTION 3

In what ways does the local Church of Philadelphia need to be reformed to better serve married couples in living faithfully to their vows? Please be specific, even offering suggestions of what a parish, school or Catholic organization might do.

The church could have more recognition of marriages. Non married couples have become such a new thing that married couples sometimes go unrecognized.

I think that we need to be mindful of who we choose to put in positions of leadership. For example, the pastor at ---- in ---- seems very disgruntled and annoyed that he has to handle business needs of the parish. Over the 15 years that we have been active members I have seen a great shift in him and the parish on a whole. Most recently when my husband and I voiced our opinion on the way that communications to the parishioners were being handled, we were told to "find a new parish". This was shocking to say the least, especially in today's day and age.

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The Parish could sponsor social events for couples - wine and cheese, dances, etc. where faithful couples could get to know each other and find supported friends.

We have found the Marriage course (AlphaUSA.org) to be an extremely useful tool to support marriages - it consists of a meal for 2 served in a semi romantic setting - home or parish - viewing a video which raises important topics, shows interviews with couples who have experienced growth through the course and gives the participating couples time to talk with each other, as well as providing books for them to review and do "home work".

Social time after mass could be offered with encouragement from the pastor - name tag Sundays could be held periodically so mass goers could become more familiar with each other.

We have found that we need to initiate many of these programs but the support and regular encouragement by the clergy is extremely helpful.

Socials for young Adults and for Families could be held - maybe monthly - rotating Young adults, Couples - families. Currently our facilities are used almost exclusively for sports.

Consider providing the formation/studies needed to serve in this ministry - it should funded as job just like a Pastoral Minister, Parish Administator or Manager position.

And I think priests should be prepared to expect that some people's marriages have serious problems resulting from mental illness, personal history, etc. There should be some preparation and awareness that marriages with abusive or other difficulties cannot be handled in the same way as other problems, even though priests cannot and should not be expected to handle such problems themselves, if they could be attuned to them, it would be a great help.

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I happen to be a recovering alcoholic. God gave me the gift of sobriety back in 1979 and has kept me sober since. In the last 38 years I have seen alcoholism come out of the closet and become recognized as the disease that it is and shed much the stigma that it once held. Today's closet condition in the Catholic Church is the marriage in trouble. It is hard to admit when one needs help, and even harder when society considers the troubled marriage as a failure. Truly ironic (and pretty sad if true) that it is probably more acceptable in our society to be divorced than to admit to struggling and needing help. How do we remove THAT stigma? TALK ABOUT IT! Ask "recovering" couples to share their experience, strength and hope. Ensure that every priest in the Archdiocese has a clear understanding of programs like Marriage Encounter and Retrouvaille. And that they know the "symptoms" to listen for, and where to direct their parishioners.

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Be approachable and available to help out when needed. Compassion is a HUGE factor in dealing with couples having marital problems.

The once-per-week homily is the biggest dose of Catholicism we receive, so when scripture readings have a marriage focus, the homily should be marriage focused. This is quite rare.

In addition, we would welcome the occasional opportunity to attend a single-day session at our local church with a focus on marriage. I realize the Archdiocese offers the occasional marriage retreat, but we are not inclined to be away for several days, or to go to an offsite location. The sessions need to be both targeted (newly married, new parents, parents of teens, new empty nesters, senior couple with ailing spouses, etc.) and very, very practical. A session that puts too much focus on the emotional aspects of marriage is not what my husband and I need. We often need practical, professional advice from trained councilors.

If they don't know Him, they will not be passionate about sharing Jesus with their families and children or embracing, following and sharing the teachings of the Catholic faith. Pastors should strongly urge all members of their parish families to attend a program like this as it can revive a parish as well as restore family life centered in Jesus. These programs should be offered at convenient times for parents as they have so many obligations with work and family.

- 1) Making pre-Cana longer than a weekend or day-long event. Couples who wish to be married in the Church should have to meet with a priest several times.
- 2) During pre-Cana, do not sugarcoat the Church's teaching on marriage, NFP, and other difficult topics. Make the meaning of the vows apparent.
- 3) Priests need to become more aware of the Church's teaching regarding NFP and they need to preach about it frequently at Mass.
- 4) Catechesis of the current generation of young parents (ages 25-40) who are the children of parents and students of teachers who mostly neglected catechesis.

Currently, support networks for this generation are non-existent from a parish perspective. Almost all networks amongst serious Catholics in this generation DO NOT use the parish as the primary means of connecting. That is a shame as there is great value in a) belonging to a parish and b) helping to build community there. Every parish in the Archdiocese should be required to spend \$100/week on a basic coffee/donuts fellowship activity after Mass, specifically designed to connect young Catholic families.

faith they are not required to do the Formed survey or even attend a Pre-Cana. They jump in without even knowing what they do not know. Also there is no follow up. After marriage there is not an attempt by individual churches or the Archdiocese to touch base with the couples, get them involved offer anything to them. There are no personal invitations or even groups within the church that minister to married couples.

I think that the Church's teaching on openness to life should be preached more boldly in the parishes. We receive strong and honest homilies about the Church's pro-life mission but never about the dangers of birth control. My personal reversion was brought about after I enrolled my daughter in a conservative Catholic school. The families there were plainly open to life and not contracepting. I felt the presence of the Holy Spirit so strongly being around these families and fell in love with the truth. I wonder why our parochial schools don't all offer a course in Theology of the Body as their sex education program. I don't think it is realistic to assume that girls and boys are being taught the fundamental principles behind NFP at home. I think that the sad majority of Catholic couples are using contraception.

When priests are preaching about mercy, could they make themselves more available for confession? Our parish, Our Lady of Lourdes, is an excellent example of very frequent opportunities for confession.

Also, within parishes, some form of a regular (monthly?) marriage building ministry, run by the laity for the laity, where couples gather in small-ish groups to share, pray for one another's intentions, and receive formation in the vocation to marriage according to a diocese-wide curriculum (for quality control). Having volunteers to provide childcare could be a huge help in enabling couples to attend, and wine/dessert or some special food/drink could help to set it apart and make it feel significant and special.

Maybe what's needed first are opportunities for fellowship for individualistic people who are living separately from their neighbors and so who have little support just to come together and get to know other Catholics and make friends with them. Initially, no agendas no catechesis, no readings; just friendship. And see where things go from there. That means that there has to be something to draw people together good coffee, a movie, etc. Above all, families are feeling disconnected from each other. After building a trusting community of faithful people, there will be

opportunities to learn and help people where they need it.

Because we live in a culture which tries to tear apart our marriages we need more activities such as retreats, talks for married couples, and gatherings where married couples young and old can meet. Our friends are not getting married or having babies, therefore we need our church pastors to bring married couples together. It was incredible to witness seeing the hundreds of married couples renewing their vows several weeks ago, it would have been even more wonderful to have a place to enjoy eachother in community through a potluck. So we ask our dear priests to simply bring couples their married or whose children they christened together.

In a society that otherwise does not seem to place much value on marriage as a vocation and life-long commitment, I need my Church to be my "safety net": a community that supports and strengthens marriage. I feel that the current mentality is that marriage is the "given", and a lot of time and energy is spent on wagging fingers at divorce, same-sex marriage, and cohabitation. But what about those of us who have already committed to marriage, and are trying very hard to not only keep it in tact but to have it flourish and grow? I don't think the Church does much to really celebrate, reaffirm, or renew that commitment. Homilies need to better address the reality of marriage and the struggles we live every day. Time should be spent celebrating and honoring the vocation of marriage. Renewing baptismal vows are important, but I'd love to see regular, ongoing opportunities to renew marital vows too. Social outlets with other married couples, family events, childcare assistance (have the parish youth group serve as babysitters so that parents can gather in fellowship!), service opportunities, and Marriage Encounters can all help strengthen marriages. I'd love to even see mini-Marriage Encounters, for those who cannot arrange childcare or a weekend away for other reasons.

Advertise! Pamphlets, blogs, website, posters in churches. Our local parish is wonderful...but if there are any services offered in any way the church does not get the word out. It seems that is all hidden not easily accessible. I was in another church in another county and they had information everywhere. Bulletin, pamphlets, and from the pulpit tell what was going on before and after mass. Again if you don't know what is offered you are not going to seek the help that is offered.

I'm not certain as to what can be done to help married couples. The high rate of divorce is evidence of a problem. Most people I know rarely mention asking for help from the parish or the clergy. We need more parish level programs for couples and definitely better preparation prior to marriage. From my own personal experience, I'm concerned that hardly anyone is listening or wants to listen. If I had a problem I wouldn't be interested in a diocese wide program and that seems to be the direction that has been taken. We spend too much time hearing about annulments and not enough prior to reaching that stage.

Another suggestion could be to have "mentors" for newly weds - a more "seasoned" couple that would walk with a newly wed couple for a specific period (TBD) of time post wedding. Maybe periodically to meet with a larger group (annually, each 6 months, etc) where specific topics could be addressed.

Again - I highly suggest the Diocese get more active in out Teams of our Lady groups to

understand what we do/ how they help. Maybe have parishes more actively promote/recruit new members.

This being said, I have wondered if a local ministry might be established to gather other families who may struggle with their faith during frequent tests of strength, challenges to their faith and emotional upheaval when raising these children, who are indeed special blessings to us all.

The Church has been very helpful with this. I am fully aware that Catholics are supposed to be open to life, should not use contraception, etc. However, one thing that I think needs to be improved is that there needs to be more Catholic doctors who help with natural family planning techniques. We meet with a woman at the Shrine of Czestochowa, and she is wonderful. However, she's the only person we're aware of in the area, and it's about a 45 minute drive for us to meet with her. It's also a bit expensive, so sometimes we'd like a refresher class, but we decide to save the money. It'd be great if there were numerous doctors and if this information was more readily available to the public.

Other than the influence of our family priest, I cannot say that any direct intervention came our way, through 6 children and putting all of them through both Catholic grammar school and high school. Pre-Cana did talk about natural family planning, and our priest gave us a book on the topic. I could have used more help. On a positive note, the school chaplain at Archbishop Wood did see us at graduation and recount something about our son. That was the first feedback that we have ever gotten from the high school level. Monsignor Gentile often comments to us that we have a beautiful family and that he is thankful for my sons ushering along beside my husband. This means a lot.

QUESTION 5

In what ways have you experienced the Church as absent, unsupportive, neutral or even a negative influence in your family life?

Sometimes I feel that something is missing on the part of clergy about the real struggles of family life. Families today are very different than in the past. Those with two parents in the home usually are both working full time to support the family. Many are single parents struggling on their own. Sometimes there seems to be judgments on the time constraints of families without an understanding of the limited time that families have due to their responsibilities.

The Church has been absent, unsupportive, neutral or even a negative influence in family life in the following ways:

(1) Because there has been little to no action by the Archdiocese until recently in effectively addressing issues with priests whether it be sexual misconduct, behavioral misconduct, or pastoral ineffectiveness, family life has been effected in negative ways.

There appears to be no accountability with priests and pastors, other than the annual spiritual

report that is submitted to the Archdiocese with key parish performance parameters & statistics. Parishes and parish families are dying a slow death as a result of poor performing priests.

These priests have not just caused families to move to another parish, but have caused families to leave the Catholic Church or stop practicing any kind of faith.

The Church often wounds us deeply. People with religious authority often wound us by their words, attitudes, and demands. Precisely because our religion brings us in touch with the questions of life and death, our religious sensibilities can get hurt most easily. Ministers and priests seldom fully realize how a critical remark, a gesture of rejection, or an act of impatience can be remembered for life by those to whom it is directed. There is such an enormous hunger for meaning in life, for comfort and consolation, for forgiveness and reconciliation, for restoration and healing, that anyone who has any authority in the Church should constantly be reminded that the best word to characterize religious authority is compassion. Let's keep looking at Jesus whose authority was expressed in compassion.

The parish's silence on these issues means that families trying to embrace and live orthodox teaching feel lonely and unsupported. You make a handful of friends, and you want to remain open to the rest of the parish. But you can't rely on parish clergy, DRE's, school teachers to be enthusiastically and creatively orthodox, so we all settle into a "don't ask, don't tell" modus operandi on family/marriage issues. We're left to cobble together whatever we can as individuals, drawing on ad hoc friendships and/or whatever para-parish apostolates we can find on the internet.

I remember once telling my pastor that my middle schooler was struggling with questions of faith. Another time I told him my wife was struggling with depression. Both times he made a referral to somebody else on the parish staff, who gave me a glib answer. The pastor never followed up. He's a busy guy and probably has his reasons, but don't call him my shepherd or spiritual father. He's an excellent property administrator though.

When I was going through my divorce, I didn't feel like I had anyone to talk to except in the confessional. There is no support for those struggling with separation and divorce and it is unfortunate as there are way to many of us going through this painful experience.

I think until I began actively seeking out resources on my own, driven by my own desire to make my marriage and family life more authentically Catholic, that the Church has largely been absent in influencing my family life as an adult except in the general sense of knowing Catholic teaching that marriage is a sacrament, it is for life, and the Church's stance on contraceptives and fertility treatments. I did find myself very alone when experiencing infertility. My husband and I tried to join a Pre Canaa group at a church since we had been married at that point for I years, had gone through many trials with family members, and had a pretty strong faith and marriage. We were absolutely made to feel 'less than' by the group because we were childless at the time. Rather than embrace us and the very real fact of infertility that many couples face and allow us to share our own faith journey to adoption, we were made to feel unqualified for the group and we eventually left. The priest who ran it saw what was going on, was quietly apologetic but never stood up and addressed the issue head-on.	

As a child at a small Catholic parish in Manayunk, there was a strong sense of community and families tended to be emphasized more. This may have been more of a cultural influence-tightly bonded Italian families-than church influenced.

When I look at my other Christian friends, I think that their churches do more to support young families. Specifically, I joined an international Christian group called Mothers of Preschoolers. This group has been pivotal to support my motherhood journey in Christ and benefit my family. We meet monthly, while childcare is provided, to pray, learn from applicable speakers, do service projects and fellowship. We also get together outside of these meetings for playgroups and moms' nights.

I wish that our Catholic Church was more hands on in this arena. While we're encouraged to have large families, there haven't been many programs that I've been able to seek out to support parents in this incredibly important work.

Our previous pastor was such a support to us in our struggles with our girls and graciously would bestow blessings and prayers over them. However our present pastor once brought me to tears when after asking him for prayers for my daughter's ill health, he told me never to bother him before Mass. On numerous occasions he has told people not to bother him with their problems. Sadly, he is certainly not someone I would ever approach again to ask for help.

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The priest scandal hit hard. Although we were not directly victims, we have several priests involved with our spiritual and family life. This was truly devastating. When the story broke we felt alone and unsupported. In those difficult days we felt the need for sacrifice, penance, and prayer, particularly in union with other Catholics in the form of Masses, holy hours, Rosaries, etc. in atonement for the sins in our archdiocese.

We chose to homeschool our children due to several reasons, including financial, but more importantly spiritual concerns. Before our oldest was about to enter 1st grade a scandal broke at the local school involving the principal, a father and former classmate of my husband, and kindergarten teacher. Unfortunately, in our experience the lack of morality is common in Catholic schools. We felt it would be impossible to entrust our children to adult Catholics who would allow this to happen. In our experience many teachers do not live out their Catholic faith.

As a homeschooling family we often feel like orphans in the archdiocese as there are no resources for school Masses, graduations, or even academic support available from the Church.

My parish has lost 30% of Mass attendees in the last year and a half due to pastoral issues, lack of leadership, and lack of accountability & responsiveness to parishioners.)

- 1. Prioritize creating support networks for the current generation of parents with kids in Catholic schools. These programs need to re-catechize the majority of parents. But before programming, parishes need to prioritize connecting faithful Catholics.
- 2. Greatly increase pre-Cana obligations to properly form engaged couples. The Archdiocese invests a decade in future priests, who are less than 5% of the Church's population. Why only a few meetings for couples we expect to be married until they die?
- 3. Teach with clarity without being afraid that the parish might become smaller in the short term. There are undoubtedly pastors who, in an effort to fill pews in order to avoid closure, become lukewarm to the "hard teachings." The Archdiocese needs to make clear that it will support institutions, however small, that are fully faithful.

If a couples group gets started, the contraceptors or the non-contraceptors get uncomfortable and leave - another example. The prolife group is considered conservative, the peace and justice group is considered liberal. For some reason, never the twain shall meet. Neither can attract the other as members. The priests serve both but don't seem to help them to unite. I believe it is a 10 year process where the pastor understands that transformation (not accommodation to all comers) is the goal and he seeks the knowledge, understanding, case studies and leadership to get it done. They are only human and will make mistakes and can't do it on their own. The renewal has to be faithful to Church teaching in every respect or the decay will continue. Catholic Marriage is a sacrament. It is a truly wonderful gift blessed by Christ Himself at Cana. It is also hard and takes WORK to make work. This is a truth we tend to shy away from. We're too embarrassed to admit that we could use some help – probably because everyone else's marriage looks so "together" – probably because anyone else who's hurting is doing the same cover-up that we are. Talk about struggle. Admit that imperfection is the state we're all in. Arguments happen, mistakes happen, hurt feelings happen. So, make sure that growth and healing have their chances to happen. Hold a "10 Great Dates" session at your parish (Awesome program! https://www.10greatdates.org/). Make sure Marriage Encounter is welcomed into your parish. Make sure Retrouvaille literature is in the rack in the vestibule and that the Weekends held at Malvern 3 times a year are advertised in your bulletin. Find out which couples in your parish have been through strife and survived. Then connect those who are willing with couples who are currently struggling. Announce long term anniversaries in your bulletins like they're the most wonderful things happening that week. Hold these couples up as the heroes they are, especially in the schools. That 3rd grader's parents have been married 10 to 15 years, make sure she knows that there's this couple named the Smiths who've been married 53 years and that we as a parish hold them in high honor. And at some point it might even be appropriate for her to know that not all of those 53 years were perfect.

And finally, ask married couples what they do for fun. My wife and I have been married 31 years and are still married today by the grace of God and the Retrouvaille program. For this I am forever grateful! Our Retrouvaille leadership reminds us of the importance of fun, and I believe that we have a responsibility that a sense of gratitude and joy be evident to others. If a couple at 10, 15, 20 years married looks to us and doesn't see something they would want for their future selves, then we as a Catholic couple have failed them. If we aren't reminding couples to have some fun in their lives then we as a Catholic society have failed them.
